## **Vermont Threatened And Endangered Species List By Town and County**

NOTE: The Eastern cougar (endangered), small whorled pogonia (threatened) and Puritan tiger beetle (endangered) are all federally listed species that no longer occur in the State at this time. The Eastern cougar and small whorled pogonia have not been documented to occur in Vermont for decades. All known suitable habitat for the Puritan tiger beetle is no longer available and the species is considered to be extirpated. The Canada lynx (threatened) and gray wolf (endangered) are considered to be extirpated, although individual animals may occasionally disperse into Vermont. The New England cottontail is proposed for listing but is considered extirpated from Vermont.
